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JOHN PENGILLY: ORIGINAL SUFFIELD PROPRIETOR

An ancient Indian path once paralleled the Great River (Connecticut River) on the western side. On October 30, 1678, John Pengilly received a 60-acre grant from the Suffield Committee along this well-worn route. The Pynchon account books recorded a payment from John Pengilly of one pound sterling for the grant. The same day, four neighboring grants were awarded to the Allens along this same trail that evolved into our River Boulevard. The Pengilly and Allen families were both coming to Suffield from the colonial settlement at Ipswich, Massachusetts.

John¹ had been listed as a corporal on the payroll of Ipswich under Captain John Appleton in the defense of Hatfield, Massachusetts on October 19, 1675. His participation in the battles of King Philip's War continued with Appleton's company. He marched from Hatfield back to Boston and then on to Rhode Island. Here he was part of the "Great Swamp Fight" on December 19, 1675.² During his years in Suffield, John Pengilly achieved the rank of Sargent and later Lieutenant in Suffield's Town Militia.

Sgt. John Pengilly was a Freeman and listed among the 34 townsmen allowed to vote at Suffield's first Town Meeting on March 6, 1682. By 1691, he was the owner of Suffield's first ferry across the Connecticut River. The ferry boarded from property that had originally been granted to his neighbor John Allen, but by this time Pengilly owned the land and the Allen family had relocated to Deerfield, Massachusetts.³

John Pengilly and his wife Mary had a son, John Jr.⁴, who later took over operation of the ferry.

John Sr. served as a Selectman many times between 1696 and 1733. He was often chosen as Moderator for Suffield Town Meetings as well as Assessor. He served Suffield well.

Similarly, John Jr. participated in the affairs of our local government between 1716 and 1742. John Jr. was part of

His name also appears as a committee member in the planning for a highway from Bushe's Bridge⁵ to the Springfield bounds ... we know it now as Halladay Avenue West.

- 2 60 years after this battle, John Pengilly was alive to receive a Narragansett Township #4 Land Grant for his service in the Great Swamp Fight. That property was in Greenwich, Massachusetts, a defunct town now under the Quabbin Reservoir.
- 3 The location of this ferry was in the vicinity of the short concrete wall on the east side of River Boulevard, nearly opposite the present home of Bruce Remington.
- 4 John Pengilly, Jr., was born in Suffield on August 26, 1693.

5 Bushe's Bridge crossed the Ffyler Brook on what is now known as Halladay Avenue West.

It's still summer, but here's a heads-up so we can all think of items to lend to the King House Museum for an interesting and enjoyable exhibit during Holidayfest on Saturday and Sunday, December 6 and 7. We're calling it VERSATILE WOOD: From Spoons to Sculpture, from Mallets to Marquetry – Things Made Mainly from Wood.

Suffield in the 18th century was known for manufacturing bowls, so we should have some of them, but how about some notable walking sticks or shillelaghs, perhaps an ornately carved Southeast Asian box, maybe a carved length of chain (your curator made one of those when he was a boy). Can someone offer a few duck decoys? Our Hadley chest, essentially destroyed in the 1983 King House fire, would have been a fabulous entry, but other interesting pieces of furniture could add to the exhibit.

Your imagination is probably better than mine, so please see what you can think up for the exhibit. Small items can be shown in locked cabinets if necessary. We like to gather things a week or two before Holiday-fest to provide time for an attractive display.

RECENT GIFTS

Also received were three handwritten volumes of reports of the School Visitors, handily saved from a dumpster many years ago by teacher Bob Okun. These came with a box of other paper items including an apparent novelization of the "Old Ti" story by Martin Smith. He was headmaster at Suffield Academy and wrote several articles on slavery in Suffield for *Connecticut Magazine*, a publication of the Connecticut Historical Society.
